HEALTHCARE for YIBEN



Kayiben (the village of Yiben, pronounced 'Ee-ben') lies south-east of Fadugu in the Koinadugu District of Sierra Leone, one of the poorest areas in the country. The village consists of approximately 40 traditional mud-brick houses and is surrounded by numerous smaller villages with a combined population of more than 1000.

The people of these communities are subsistence farmers relying entirely on the seasons and hard work to survive. They have been disadvantaged by isolation and poverty and lacked access to basic services. They want their children to have a better life and know that education and modern healthcare are the keys.

Thanks to the friendship and dedication of a local visionary Minkailu Bantama (Mallam), and with funding from friends in the UK and Australia, the Yiben community built a school to bring education and opportunity to their children. The school serves a number of other villages and places Yiben as a 'hub' for the area.

With access to education achieved, healthcare became Yiben's priority. Now they have built a government-standard healthcare facility so they can access safe birthing facilities, maternal and child services, free national health programs and basic treatments for common ailments.



A Section Chief in his own community near Fadugu, Mallam has strived for education and healthcare for the people of this remote area since 2006. Working closely with Yiben's Chief Bangalie and Mammy Queen Serah, Mallam has brought their dreams of a school and health clinic to reality. It's an inspiring story!

SET4LIFE Australia

SET4LIFE Australia is a small fundraising charity based in the regional Queensland city of Gympie. Our members began working with Mallam to support the development of the Yiben School in 2011. We were involved in the establishment of the UK-based charity Set4Life in 2013, and in 2015 our group registered Set4Life Australia (S4LA) to increase our fund-raising capacity.

While Set4Life UK continued to support the primary school, S4LA raised funds for health facilities and advocated for services under the national health system. With Mallam's management and the community's labour, work began on their clinic in 2016. Permanent services commenced in January 2019 with basic provisions and two national nurses who speak the local language.

We have funded a large motor boat that provides river access much of the way from Fadugu for 6-7 months a year, along with nurses' quarters and clean-water wells for the school and clinic. In 2020 we added support for students to attend high school.

Gympie's connection with Yiben resulted when hometown nurse and midwife, Amy Coates volunteered her skills in Sierra Leone in 2009, and worked there over several years in different areas of health development. The relationship with Mallam and Yiben began in 2011, when Amy's mum, Jude, spent a week in the remote community helping in their tiny school. Inspired by the DIY ambitions of the village, and Mallam's compassion and capacity, Jude and friends formed a support team.

Amy has since worked in international public health roles and brings to the team her passion for health development and her wealth of connections and experience in Sierra Leone.
